FAQ for NPD

1. Can I park my car in my front yard?

You can only park your car in your front yard if it is on a hard surface driveway. You cannot legally park your vehicle, boat, trailer or any other vehicle on your front lawn.

2. What do I do with my vehicle that is in storage?

If you have a vehicle in storage it needs to be placed in an enclosed garage or shed. If the vehicle is parked outside it must be properly registered and must be operable.

3. What does it mean when you say a vehicle has to be operable.

A vehicle is operable when it is capable of being driven on a public street. If a vehicle is missing any equipment necessary to be driven on a public street, then it is not operable. Equipment that is necessary to be driven legally would include, but is not limited to, engine, axles, windshield, transmission, 4 properly inflated tires, working lights and brake lights.

4. Can I leave my vehicle parked on the street?

A vehicle cannot be parked on a city street for more than 72 hours without being moved.

5. Where can I park my boat and trailers?

Boats and trailers may not be parked anywhere on the front lot of a residence. Boats and trailers can be parked on side yards of houses as well as the back yards. Boats and trailers may not be parked on the side yard of a corner lot, if the owner has access to his back yard. If there is no access to the back yard because of a fence or hedges, then a boat and trailer may be parked on the side yard of a corner lot.

6. Can I park my boat or trailer in the street?

You cannot park your boat or trailer in the street because it hinders the vision of other homeowners as they try to exit their driveway.
